Letter from our Rector, Rev. Steve Stewart:

The sun is up, school's out, suitcases packed, trains on strike, and the airplanes grounded – the classic British summer has arrived! Yes, it's the time of year when we try to get away for a well-earned break in the hope of finding some peace and some rest. But the fact is that peace and rest can be very elusive. A week's break makes the pressures of this life easier to deal with, but rarely makes them disappear. And if we find ourselves in financial distress, even the hope of a week's break can disappear altogether. With the stresses of damaged relationships, illness and bereavement, even a holiday can fail to bring peace even if it brings a period of rest.

I became a Christian when I was 17 (43 years ago this August), and one of the greatest blessings that I have found in following Jesus Christ is true, deep and lasting peace. Whatever life has thrown at me – failure, frustration, loss, worry, illness and more – the one thing that God has given to me is deep and certain peace. When I was a young man, I said to a wise and older Christian friend, "I don't how people manage without Jesus", to which he replied simply "Steve, I don't think they do".

And a great part of my motivation for wanting to be a leader and teacher of God's people is not just that Christianity stands up to forensic investigation, not simply that I want to see people saved to eternal life, but that I want people to experience the peace of God. And I know that that blessing of peace is not just special to me, but something which God promises to everyone who believes in his son Jesus Christ. As it says in the Bible.

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7).

My prayer for each of you in our communities in Hanborough and Freeland this summer is not only that you will be able to get a good break, but that you will find the true peace and rest which only Jesus Christ can offer.

UPDATE ON NATURE RECOVERY & NO MOW MAY

You will remember that the Parish Council supported the efforts of Freeland's nature Recovery Group led by Russell Fisher and Amanda Watson? Well No Now May went really well, and those selected verges which yielded plenty of pollen, seeds and habitats for wildlife at the time when it was most needed, have now been cut.

Regarding the selected wildflower plots in the village, progress has been a little more mixed. Planting seeds is about taking a leap of faith, as so much can affect successful germination. Sun, no sun, rain, no rain and cold or lack thereof! Yellow rattle requires a period of cold and we were a bit worried that our mild winter would affect the germination of the seeds sown at our various sites. Overall, our sowing seems to have been successful with some sites showing more success than others.

The small verge at the top of Oaklands has shown a reasonable amount of success. Earlier in the year some vetch species and buttercups found their way to the top as well as pockets of yellow rattle. However, the grass has now grown considerably which suggests the soil is quite high in nutrients. After it has been cut and removed at the end of July, it will have a bit more chance to bloom in further years. This site will be a 'slow grower'.

The Parklands site has been a little less successful. Yellow rattle was sown on half of the patch leaving the thistle and ragwort to grow on the other side. Oxeye daisies have also had some success in breaking through the tall grass. The blooms of ragwort and thistle look stunning and provide fantastic nectar for bees and butterflies. Ragwort, although a fantastic plant for wildlife, can be a real bully so some management will need to be done on this in order to improve plant diversity. Yellow rattle and shade tolerant wildflowers will be sown again this autumn.

Broadmarsh Lane has probably seen the greatest growth of yellow rattle with large pockets coming up across the whole verge. You can really see where the yellow rattle has grown and while the grass is still getting tall it is not as vigorous and is patchier. Hopefully next year will see further suppression of grass and more wildflowers making themselves known. By contrast, the little patch in the lane between Wroslyn Road and Broadmarsh Lane has seen a wonderful succession of poppies, phacelia & cornflowers.

The Green has been looking stunning with a blaze of red from the poppies being followed by the blue of the cornflowers, and now oxeye daisies. Because of this success, the plot at The Green won't be cut until the autumn.

We have been busy collecting yellow rattle seed to sow again in the autumn and are now awaiting the first cut of the sites. This will be done in July/August and all cuttings will be removed so as not to add any more nutrients.

We will be looking to do another cut, scarify and re-sow in September/October if anyone would like to join in! Details to follow nearer the time.

RESULTS OF THE 'FREELAND 2032' SURVEY

Throughout May and early June, Freeland Parish Council ran a survey of residents – thank you if you participated! A large number entered a prize draw, and we're delighted to announced that the winners drawn for the £25 shopping vouchers were: John Hoer, Sue Tomkys, Jonathan Langford and Paul Wilmott, who have now all been given their vouchers.

All in all, **149** usable responses were received, and this is a snapshot of the main observations. Please bear in mind this is NOT representative of the whole village, just answers from those who took part – which means results need to be interpreted with care.

Transport and mobility

While over half of those who responded can always get where they want, when they want, just under half experience challenges of some kind, and just under a quarter cannot walk more than a few hundred metres. Those who use public transport mostly use the train, and more than half of participants rarely or never use public transport at all. However, more than half say they would use it more often if it was convenient and available. Better transport links would provide most improvement to the village!

Traffic and cars

Many people were concerned about speeding and volume of traffic, and the danger posed by cars parked on Wroslyn Road, as well as the irritation from cars parked around the school. Better cycling and walking links to Eynsham in particular was mentioned as a way of reducing traffic and improving safety, as well as better pedestrian crossing places in the village and the urgent need to divert traffic around Freeland to reduce impacts from the development of Salt Cross.

Housing and development

The main concern over housing was inappropriate development and over-development, and the risk of merging with neighbouring villages. A small number (6%) said they were looking for housing in the village – mainly smaller properties to downsize to, or starter homes.

Social interaction


More than half of respondents do not live in families, but are single or couples, and these find it harder to socialise and meet people. Lack of social opportunities and the desire to have a strong and supportive community within the village were both echoed throughout the survey. This was for all, but noted particularly for the oldest and youngest respondents.


Salt Cross

This scored **7/10** in terms of level of concern, with **0** meaning no concerns, and **10** meaning highest concerns. Lack of understanding as to why it is needed and the impact it will have, as well as fears over traffic, were largely behind negative scores.



Things people liked about Freeland: The friendly community, peacefulness, rural setting, access to the countryside and lack of street lighting together formed over two thirds of the reasons people liked Freeland.


Things people disliked about Freeland: While amenities such as the pub, hall, garden centre and little library were very appreciated, lack of other amenities including shop, café and post office formed 28% of the least-liked aspects of Freeland. This was closely followed by lack of public transport at 18%. However, traffic-related concerns (speeding, traffic volume and parking along Wroslyn road) together comprised 20% of the 'dislikes'. Other reasons were very fragmented and formed small percentages of the responses.



Fears for the future: These were similarly fragmented among a large number of items, but overdevelopment was a headline at almost a third of responses in total, with the risk of merging with neighbouring villages forming a further 10%. Increasing traffic volume and use of the village as a rat-run comprised 15% of responses about fears for the future, with continuing lack of amenities or closure of existing amenities representing 8%.

Hopes for the future: These were mostly about better village amenities (again, shop, café, post office), with many holding out hope for a community hub. 16% wanted the village to stay as it currently is (peaceful, attractive and with village character), and 9% each wanted a strong community and improved environmental credentials, including 'greening' and support for nature. It is worth noting that improved infrastructure including public transport, roads, and pathways for cycling and walking, together formed 12% of responses.

Next steps

The Parish Council discussed the survey results at its July meeting and agreed to set up a meeting of interested village residents for October – date to be advised. In the survey, over 30 people expressed interest in helping with the survey follow up, so it's hoped they and others will be able to come along to talk about the potential of setting up some groups to look at areas such as: Amenities; Traffic; and Social opportunities/community. Sustainability/green issues is suggested for a fourth group, which will also feed into the other groups as opportunities to protect our environment and cut our greenhouse gas emissions affect all activities.

Ukrainian Homes Support Group

HOME FOR UKRAINE SCHEME - JULY UPDATE

In June we had three new Ukrainian arrivals and nobody leaving the group. In July we have four further Ukrainian arrivals, two in Freeland and two in Combe.

Three weekly English lessons, Sunday afternoon Meetings with the Food Hub Offering, Clothing Store, Haircuts, etc all continued. At the end of the month we decided to stop the Thursday morning social meeting because demand had really dropped as our guests found employment and had developed friendships. Sincere thanks to Fiona McGrady and her team of bakers and coffee makers who made that Thursday meeting so valued in the early months.

Jubilee Day was an amazing fund raising event for the Homes for Ukraine Scheme - our thanks to the Parish council for sharing profits from the day with us. We received £1000 from the event and this has helped us to not only supply a trouser and top 'cagoul' set to each of our 36 guests but also welly boots. We also managed to recondition and supply all secondary school children where needed with pads or laptops to help their studies. With the Jubilee money included, we have raised £3510 to date and have a surplus of £724.

June 25th saw all of our guests taken by coach to Glympton Village Country Fayre with a 53 seater coach, picnic lunch, free activities (horse rides, archery, air-rifle range, etc) for all Ukrainians, as well as afternoon tea, all funded by the Bahrainian owner of Glympton Manor. It was by all accounts an amazing day and was only possible with the amazing support of Alaa Al-Yousuf who put himself forward to manage the day and ensure that the day went smoothly for all who went and the same number arrived back to the various coach drop off points as had been collected on the way there! Thank you so much Alaa from all Hosts and Ukrainians!

With the Russia / Ukrainian war intensifying the focus of the Ukrainians is on what happens after the 6 months Homes for Ukraine Scheme and guests are having discussions with Hosts about plans at the end of 6 months. At the same time Hosts are waiting for guidance from Central Government whether the 6 month scheme will be extended to 12 months for those hosts happy to continue and with WODC about possible arrangements for guests who will be leaving their sponsor homes and any Deposit bond schemes and rent support for getting set up with private rentals.

We hope to know more before the end of July so we can support our guests and help find them landlords who are sympathetic to renting their second homes and Air B&B properties to Ukrainians receiving benefits and housing allowance. If you are prepared to offer any accommodation, whether rooms in a shared house or self contained accommodation on a paid-for basis please do make contact and let us know, likewise if you would consider a six month involvement in the Homes for Ukraine Scheme from November 2022, please do let us know.

OTHER LOCAL HEALTH NEWS

A new chapter for the NHS in Oxfordshire, Buckinghamshire and West Berkshire

Over the past fifteen years, the NHS in Oxfordshire has been overseen by the Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group (OCCG). However, as part of a national change in the way the NHS is organised the new NHS Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire and Berkshire West Integrated Care Board (known as the BOB ICB) took over from the 1st July.

The aim is to bring together GP teams, hospitals, local authorities, the voluntary sector and other partners to plan and deliver health and care services for more than 1.9 million people across those three areas.

These changes are part of the 2022 Health and Care Act which aims to make it easier for the NHS and social care organisations to work better together.



FREELAND GARDENING CLUB

The subject for the meeting on June 27th was 'The Rococo Garden at Painswick' given by Dominic Hamilton who is very involved with the Garden at present. He told us that Painswick is the unique and only genuine Rococo Garden left in the country. It was designed in 1740 for Benjamin Hyatt as a pleasure garden, involving the ornamental décor, pastel colours and asymmetry popular at the time with follies to surprise and delight the eye. He first gave a history of the adjoining house and of its and the garden's development. He also had many interesting pictures to show. The garden is famous for its many varieties of snowdrops that flower in the spring. As the garden is only in Gloucester it is an easy day visit's journey away.

The meeting on **Monday 25th July at 7.30pm** in Freeland Hall is a talk by Michael Brown entitled 'Shakespeare's Flowers' It will be interesting to find out whether the same flowers are popular at present.

The Club always holds some form of social in August. Rather than organising a party this year we are planning to go to Bridewell Organic Garden at Wilcott on **Monday 22nd August** for an organised evening tour and refreshments at a cost of £5 per person. In order to know numbers, please contact Brian our Treasurer (883968) to book and pay for a place. This will give the Committee an idea of the numbers interested. Private cars will be used, with lifts offered where possible. Further information will be given nearer the time. Visitors very welcome.

Freeland Gardening Club is a very friendly welcoming Club offering a wide range of first class speakers. The first visit is free with very reasonable subs due after the AGM in October. If you are new to the village do come along and let us know you are new. There is a Bring and Buy Plant and Gardening Items sale and refreshments at all Hall meetings.

Jobs for August involve feeding borders, planters and hanging baskets. Deadhead annuals after flowering. Keep picking sweetpeas till they run out of steam then replace them with a late flowering climber such as cobea. Thinking ahead, buy spring flowering bulbs while the best are available, plant autumn crocus and cyclamen hederifolium. Plant amaryllis to flower around Christmas time. Watch out for the red lily beetles and remove and dispose of them. Powdery mildew is seen on a wide range of plants in a late dry summer. Remove effected leaves or treat with a fungicide. Watch out for white fly on vegetables and greenhouse plants. Prevent by spraying or grow African Marigolds nearby. Ventilate the greenhouse to keep it cool and spray water on concrete paths to increase humidity. Prune Phlomis, early flowering annuals, Wisteria and Spirea. In the fruit and veg garden keep harvesting beans before they get stringy, and other crops. Dig potatoes and lift onions. Keep light from stored potatoes and dry off onions ready for storage. Cut down strawberries to ground level and feed. Remove any straw from around plants. Lastly sow herbs, savoy cabbage, spinach and salads.

FREELAND ORCHESTRA & WOW'S SUMMER CONCERT REVIEW

(Friday 1st July)

What a delight to be listening again to live performances from the Freeland Orchestra and West Oxfordshire Winds, under the thoughtful and energetic leadership of Wendy Marks.

To open the evening, we were transported to the continent with a lively performance of Gounod's Scherzo and Trio (from Symphony No.1), where lyrical wind passages were interspersed with punchy staccato from the strings. The Allegro from the same symphony followed this bright introduction, the opening staccato bars catching our attention before the main theme allowed different instruments to shine, and providing a glorious and entertaining climax.

This was followed by Ronald Binge's Elizabethan Serenade (fitting for this platinum Jubilee year) with the bright sound of the woodwind shining above the warmth of the strings.

Their final piece was Gershwin's depiction of An American in Paris, where the orchestra was boosted with the addition of drums, saxophones and a bass clarinet. Intended by Gershwin as a 'light jolly piece', the performance showed us various moods of the title character: a jolly swagger in Paris through busy streets with car horns and the sound of hurrying trains contrasting with the contemplative passages suggestive of the character's longing for home. We could 'see' him stopping and setting off again through Paris. These scenes really came to life in this atmospheric rendition.

After a short interval the audience was treated to a brisk start with West Oxfordshire Winds playing Pusceddu's Augusta, a lively march, rhythmic and cheerful. The precise and spirited playing of WOW was again reminiscent of this year's parades celebrating the platinum jubilee.

The Crooner's Serenade (Michael Bublé) had the audience tapping their toes to the swinging rhythms. Wendy brought out lovely lyrical playing from the flutes and warm tone from the band, and the piece ended with a triumphant flourish.

Another toe-tapping piece followed in the form of an Italian Polka by Rachmaninov (originally composed for piano).

We were then transported to the dance floor with a swinging rendition of Hello Dolly. Audience participation was requested for the next item, Brubeck's Unsquare Dance. After a short practice, the audience's rhythmic clapping was swelled by sections of the band joining in one after another, and the joint effort, brilliantly in time, led to a crisp and happy ending.

The concert drew to a close with a treat for the audience in the form some familiar ABBA themes from the Mamma Mia film, including Dancing Queen, Money, Money, Money, and the final destination for the evening, Waterloo.

A further article from Julie Stuart-Thompson on the service personnel listed on the War Memorial in St Mary's Church Yard.

Wilfred Sydney Long December 1922 - 30th July 1944

Wilfred was born in the December of 1922. His parents were Samuel Long and Annie Maria Webb. They were married in the Witney registration district in March 1913. They had four children, Gladys Eva b June 1914, Albert E J b June 1916, Wilfred Sidney and Joyce W b December 1924.

Samuel was born on 31st May 1884 in Oxfordshire as was Annie Maria who was born on 24th November 1986. On the 1939 Register, the family were living together in "The Bungalow" in Freeland. Samuel was a general labourer, Annie Maria kept home, Gladys was a domestic servant, Albert a sawyer, Wilfred an apprentice to a carpenter joiner and Joyce also helping at home. The family lived either next door/opposite or very close to Lionel and Lydia Edgington. Tracing Samuel through the census material, his parents were William b 1848 and Ann b 1851. In 1891 Samuel is a scholar aged 6, by 1901 he is a carter on a farm aged 16 and by 1911 was listed as a motor cleaner. The family were listed as living at Broad Road, Taylor's Buildings and Wood End, all in Long Hanborough. He had 9 siblings, including George 1874, Ada 1875, Enos 1881, Lewis 1889 and Leah 1891. The 1911 census tells us that William and Annie had been married for 33 years and had 12 children, 10 of who were living. The 1901 also records with them Daisy Merry, their grand daughter, born 1895 in Freeland. Samuel Long died 1st May 1953 aged 68 and Annie Maria died 19th February 1970 aged 84. They rest together in the far left corner of St Mary's.

Annie Maria's parents were John b1858 in Watchfield Berks and Harriet nee Pullen b1859 in North Leigh. John was a wheelwright, an occupation his son John, also took on. Annie Maria was the eldest daughter. Her siblings were Frederick William b1884, May b1889, John Henry b1891, Frank b1895, Albert 1897, and Winifred b1901. John and Harriet married in June 1882 in Witney and lived for at least the period between 1901 and 1911 in Carter's Hanborough. All their 7 children were born in Hanborough. John died in March 1927 aged 68 and Harriet died March1933 aged 73.

Corporal Wilfred Sidney Long 5392708, served with the Ist Battalion Hampshire Regiment. He died on 30th July 1944, aged just 21. He was originally buried in Les Landes in Normandy but from 25th June 1945, rests in the Tilly-Sur-Seulles War Cemetery 11.A.7 along with a total of 1221 casualties. On his headstone, his parents asked for the words "Loved and remembered always". His name obviously also appears on the War Memorial step and on his father's headstone in St Mary's.

The 1st Battalion Hampshire regiment had begun the war in Egypt in 1939, then moved to Malta in 1941, by July 1943 they were involved in the invasion of Sicily and in July 1943 landed on mainland Italy. They returned to the UK in November 1943 for the first time in 22 years. On the 6th of June they came ashore on Gold beach, with no supporting tanks. Despite facing machine gun fire, the men captured Le Hamel and Arromanches after a hard day of fighting. By the end of D-Day they had 182 casualties, 64 of them killed in action. This would become the site of an artificial Mulberry harbour for further landings by the Allies. The battalion then started a three week fight for the next objective, the village of Hottot against the German Panzer Lehr Division, with the major assault on 11th July. Later in the month they fought on to Villiers Bocage, St Germain d'Ectot and Launy. Wilfred died on the 30th July during this phase of fighting in Normandy.

We have written directly to Legal & General (parent company of Inspired Villages) to ask them not to lodge an appeal.

We believe that this development is wrong for our village, and will campaign once again if does go to appeal.




